

REGION 6—ST. LAWRENCE

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Weather was generally unremarkable this fall. Watertown's mean monthly temperatures for September and November were each less than 1° F below normal, but October was warmer, with a mean temperature of 55.0° that was 4.7° above normal. Total seasonal precipitation was about 2% higher than normal, mostly because the 6.4" of rain that fell in October was 112% of normal. September and November were drier, with precipitation totals that were 6% and 5% below normal, respectively.

Waterfowl numbers were generally low, with only a few unusual species. One Greater White-fronted Goose at Upper and Lower Lakes WMA on 9 October and six Cackling Goose reports were highlights, but for yet another fall Snow

Geese largely passed Region 6 by. Relatively low duck numbers were especially noticeable at Wilson Hill WMA, often the site of the region's largest fall duck concentrations, where Mallard, American Wigeon, Northern Pintail, Green-winged Teal, Ring-necked Duck, and Redhead were all down 50-65% from peak 2020 numbers. One each Canvasback and Red-crested Pochard were found in the Wilson Hill *Aythya* rafts, the latter presumably an escape and surely the same individual present the previous year. Perhaps the most notable ducks of the season were a Regionally high 25 Ruddy Ducks at Perch Lake on 20 November, and early Barrow's Goldeneye at Pillar Point 25 November and Point Peninsula 30 November.

An **Eared Grebe** in the St. Lawrence River near Massena 24 October was among the season's highlights, but was only seen for an hour or two. Horned Grebes were scarce, but one was near the Wilson Hill causeway at the very early date of 4 September. Cattle Egrets were well reported in western Jefferson County through the first half of November, with as many as six seen at a time, although one to three per day was more typical. During most years Cattle Egrets are seen singly if at all in Region 6. On 25 September Brian Miller photographed a Black Vulture on the Westcott Beach State Park shoreline, the season's only sighting of a species that is increasing modestly throughout the Region.

Despite high water on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River that left little in the way of exposed mudflats, birders did have some luck with shorebirds. Low water continued at the Stone Mills Pool at Perch River WMA, which was probably the Region's most consistent shorebird spot. Among the shorebird highlights here was a Stilt Sandpiper on 17 September, the season's only Red-necked Phalarope on 27 September, and a regionally rare **Long-billed Dowitcher** 8-15 October. Stilt Sandpipers are regular at Perch River but rarely detected elsewhere, so one at Whalen Park on the St. Lawrence River 4 September was a county bird for many observers. Water levels on the stretch of the St. Lawrence between the Iroquois and Moses-Saunders Dam remained high all season, limiting shorebird viewing opportunities, but exposed mudflats on the East Pool at Wilson Hill WMA attracted modest numbers of shorebirds early in the season, including at least two Baird's Sandpipers and the season's only White-rumped Sandpiper.

Nick Leone seems to be the only Regional birder who spent much time lake watching, and he was rewarded with three juvenile **Black-legged Kittiwakes** on 31 October and two more on 22 November, all at Montario Point. Nick also saw the season's only Glaucous Gull at the same location on 19 November. Other larids of note include an adult Little Gull among more than 100 Bonaparte's Gulls at Henderson Harbor on 10 September, and a Forster's Tern at Wilson Hill WMA on 24 September.

On Fort Drum a Red-headed Woodpecker nest that still had one nestling in it on 31 August apparently fledged on the late date of 1 September. At least six adult Red-headed Woodpeckers were observed caching food on Fort Drum during October and November, apparently taking advantage of a large acorn crop to prepare to overwinter. A juvenile Red-headed Woodpecker was at Richard

Brouses's feeders for several days in mid-November. The pace of the Red-bellied Woodpecker expansion seems to be increasing, with reports from more than 40 locations throughout lowland portions of Region 6.

The fall passerine migration was much more active than during the previous two years, with regular pulses of moderate to heavy migration for much of the season except for an extended period during the first half of October when pervasive south winds seemed to shut migration down. Most species didn't seem particularly abundant, but were more conspicuous than during the fall of 2020, when southbound migrants were hard to find in many places. However, Philadelphia Vireo numbers were exceptional, with more than 60 reports and a very high daily maximum of 15 on Fort Drum 9 September. By contrast just two Orange-crowned Warblers represents the lowest fall tally since 2013. Also down were Tree and Barn Swallows, with just seven reports of the former and none of the latter after the first week of September, continuing a troubling trend of declining swallow numbers that has been particularly noticeable the past two years.

On 14 November Jay McGowan, Drew Weber, and Ian Davies encountered impressive numbers of late migrants at Robert Wehle State Park, many apparently taking advantage of a huge red cedar berry crop. Among the hordes of American Robins and Cedar Waxwings were lingering migrants such as White-crowned Sparrow and Cape May Warbler, an impressive 21 Fox Sparrows, and seasonally high tallies of four Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers, five Hermit Thrushes, and 29 Yellow-rumped Warblers. Given the abundance of cedar berries it was hoped that many of these birds would stick around a while, so birders were disappointed to find that most of these birds had departed by the following weekend, although Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers, Hermit Thrushes, and Yellow-rumped Warblers seemed to be settling in for the winter. Many other species were noted at unusually late dates, perhaps most notably a Wood Thrush Larry Chen and Sarah Toner found at Robert Wehle State Park on 24 November.

For the season I received reports of 233 species, a little more than seven above the most recent ten-year mean but identical to the fall 2020 tally. Certainly, a number of interesting birds were seen but there were no stand-out rarities, and as so often occurs in Region 6, most of the rare birds that were found were only seen by one or two birders. At least for this author the true highlight of the season was the relatively good passerine flight, perhaps best represented by the abundance of Philadelphia Vireos. The biggest disappointment was the near lack of swallows and the resultant concern about these and other aerial insectivores.
